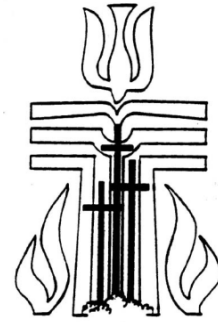

Two Thousand Years Film Discussion Series

Have you ever wondered how the church we know and love came to be? This year's Wonderful Wednesday program includes a recurring film discussion series, *Two Thousand Years: The History of Christianity*. Each episode, beautifully filmed and thought-provoking, covers a century of the history of Christianity in about 25 minutes, leaving plenty of time for discussion.

Better Than a Diet!

“Load Me Up!” Sure, you’ve said that to someone as you were gathering firewood or maybe laundry. You can carry more when someone else piles it on! I had a seminary class called “New Testament Exegesis” that required me to get the guy down the hall to load my arms with about a dozen BIG books, in addition to the full backpack I was already wearing! (As Dave Barry says, “I am not making this up!”). The real irony is that today you can get all the information in all those books on one CD. I imagine all those present-day Bible-scholars-in-training hunkered over their laptops! The down-side is that with laptops, you can’t construct little fortresses out of all your books and lay low when the professor asked the really hard questions!

While this form of Bible-study was certainly challenging, it did have its rewards. It engendered a profound respect for

the richness of God’s Word and for the scholars who have labored to make it more understandable for us today.

I have heard many of you speak of the fresh discoveries that you experience each time you sit down with the Bible!

My point is that there is a wealth of information out there about virtually every word written in the Bible. People who study the Bible all of their lives still learn something new every day. As you are making your New Year’s resolutions, why not consider adding some Bible Study to your list of priorities—I’ll be glad to loan you some BOOKS!

Note from The Associate Pastor

It’s not news that many federal holidays have become little more than excuses for stores to have big sales. The holiday that honors Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., January 19 of this year, hasn’t really become a major shopping day (yet), but it’s still underappreciated.

Did you know that Dr. King once spoke at Montreat? It was in the summer of 1965, shortly after the Watts riots, as part of what was called the Christian Action Conference, and a scratchy audio recording of the speech exists. Delivered in Montreat’s Anderson Auditorium on the afternoon of 21 August, the speech was obviously one he had delivered many times, but it was no less powerful for that. It contained many of the famous ideas for which Dr. King is remembered:

- ~ “The arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice.”
- ~ “Time itself is neutral; it can be used either destructively or constructively. . . . Human progress never rolls in on wheels of inevitability; it comes through the tireless efforts of men willing to be co-workers with God. . . . We must use time creatively, in the knowledge that the time is always ripe to do right.”

And the stirring conclusion: “This will be a great day. It will not be the day of the white man; it will not be the day of the

black man; it will be the day of man as man. And this will be the day that all over this great nation, all of God’s children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Catholics and Protestants, will be able to join hands and sing, in the words of the old Negro spiritual, ‘Free at last, free at last; thank God Almighty, we are free at last!’”

Dr. King concluded by building and sharing a vision of the “beloved community,” grounded in love of enemies and an embrace of the philosophy of nonviolent resistance. This was a philosophy that was both strategy and tactic, and it was aggressive in an entirely countercultural way: *you can beat us up, but we’re going to keep loving you until we wear you down.*

We don’t live in the same world anymore—some things have indeed changed for the better. But in a world torn by war and terror, a world in which racial and ethnic prejudices are still alive and well, a little “beloved community” and a dash of nonviolent resistance might still go a long way. As we begin this new year, let’s all recall and act on the truth in Dr. King’s words: “We must use time creatively, in the knowledge that the time is always ripe to do right.”

- ~ *Dick Bobb* reported that income continues to be short of budget needs. Pledge campaign is well under the proposed budget for 2009.
- ~ *Ed Lockwood*, Treasurer, received a notice that Trinity is a beneficiary of the Jameson Trust providing the church \$10,000 this year, with more in the years to come. Session is grateful to the Jameson family.
- ~ *Ed Lockwood* and *Dick Bobb* are meeting with three accounting firms to discuss an audit of Trinity Church.
- ~ *John and Gay Antrim* have been removed from the church rolls at their request.
- ~ *Dwight Olin Christenbury, IV* was baptized on December 7, 2008.
- ~ Recorded the death of *Catherine Thompson*
- ~ Recorded the death of *Marty Irving*
- ~ *Dwight Christenbury III* expressed his thanks for all the kindnesses extended to him and to his family on December 7, 2008 when his son was baptized at the morning worship service, and in the afternoon when he was Ordained and Installed as our new Associate Pastor.
- ~ The following newly elected Elders were introduced and examined: *Mary Louise (Mel) Bringle, Edith L. (Edie) Clark, Elizabeth (Beth) S. Harris, Neena G. Haskins (re-elect), and David M. Shadron*. Motion was made to approve these newly-elected Elders. Installation of these Elders-elect and the new Deacons-Elect will be at both services on January 11, 2009.
- ~ *Deeana Bennett* was examined in preparation for the baptism of her and *Paul's* twin sons. They were baptized at the 8 p.m. Christmas Eve Worship Service.
- ~ Memorial Gardens remodeling has begun.
- ~ *Sarah and Evans Thibodeau* and *Bev and Jim Luzadder* have agreed to help prepare communion along with the

Bakers and the *Widmayers* who have already been helping with communion preparation.

- ~ Stewardship reported that as of December 2, 2008 we have received 152 pledges totaling \$340,000 to the Operating Fund (proposed budget is \$427,000). This is below the amount secured at this time last year. Capital Fund has received 78 pledges for \$47,000 vs. 126 pledges for \$72,000 last year.
- ~ Staff Evaluations were reviewed and it was agreed that Trinity has an excellent staff that work well together and provide services of a high quality for the church members.
- ~ *Lynn Moore* reported that *Jack Presseau* is leaving the Christian Education Ministry after many long years of service. The Clerk has written a letter thanking him for his continued service with CE.
- ~ Local Missions discussed ways to involve Trinity members with the Hispanic community per the 2004 Long Range Plan.
- ~ The committee is interested in learning more about the plight of the homeless students in Henderson County.
- ~ In February 2009 there will be a 'Restock the Cupboard' food drive and in October 2009 there will be a 'Share the Harvest' food drive – both drives to benefit I.A.M.
- ~ Global Missions reported that the Christmas Joy Offering that will occur on December 21, 2008.
- ~ Trinity Fellowship Thirty is a rousing success Mark plans to begin an 'Inquirer's Class' soon.
- ~ *Mark Stanley* gave a 'Word of Thanks and Appreciation' to the 'outgoing team of Elders' *Dick Bobb, Neena Haskins – (re-elect), Lynn Moore, Bev Luzadder, and Dick Wheeler*.
- ~ Next Stated Session Meeting will be January 13, 2009 at 6:30 p.m.

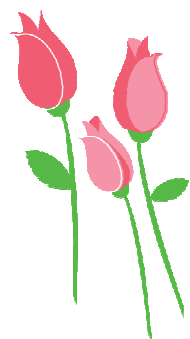

Faith Link

Faith Link and LEEP are familiar mission programs to the Trinity Family. Since 1998 Trinity members have volunteered to partner with families in Henderson County who are struggling to obtain and sustain employment while managing families. In addition the LEEP program connects Faith Link children with individual learning mentors and meets weekly at Trinity during the school year. The Faith Link families join with us for our “Wonderful Wednesday” dinners and Friends of Jesus programs. While here the Faith Link parents attend a “Parenting Roundtable”

facilitated by a Faith Link coordinator. Funding for the Faith Link programs comes from the Henderson County Dept. of Social Services, the local faith community and from fund raising and donations. Faith Link receives funds from Trinity’s Local Mission Budget.

Hashing It Out: A New Learning Hour Opportunity for Young Adults

What does Christian faith have to do with human life? That’s a seemingly dumb question to ask in a Christian congregation—and yet we see examples all the time of ways in which faith and everyday life can have an uncomfortable relationship.

Hashing It Out is a new Learning Hour opportunity for PC@TPC and other young adults, beginning January 11, in which we’ll tackle a different social, moral, and/or theological issue each week and explore the ways that our faith influences—and is influenced by—the decisions we make and the positions we take.

We’ll begin each class by viewing a short video discussion between the Christian pastor-teachers Tony Campolo and Steve Brown; then, we’ll pick up where they leave off and “hash it out” on our own. Topics in the video series include:

- Are Religion and Science in Conflict?
- Is the Devil Real?
- Can a Christian Be a Capitalist?
- Should Christians Support Gun Control?
- Can a Christian Be Pro-Choice?

We won’t be looking for easy answers, and we won’t be engaging in hostile debates—but we *will* enjoy stimulating discussions in a caring and safe environment as we seek to grow our understanding of our faith, ourselves, and some of the issues that are so divisive in the church and society.

The class will be led by *Mark Stanley* and *Dwight Christenbury*. Please join us on Sunday mornings, beginning January 11, at 9:45 a.m. in room 206 for *Hashing It Out*. Every week will feature a new topic, so come when you can!
