PASTOR'S CORNER



Welcome to September! "Thirty days hath September."

This little phrase is a part of a familiar poem that apparently was a favorite of Groucho Marx. He once said, "My favorite poem is the one that starts, 'Thirty days hath September' because it actually means something."

The meaning of "Thirty days hath September" is obvious and straightforward, but what else might this pithy mnemonic offer for our September, 2022?

Thirty days hath Trinity Presbyterian: to participate in the 40th Hunger Walk on Saturday, Sept. 17th; to celebrate the "Season of Creation" during worship each Sunday; and to join in a celebratory "Season of Creation" picnic on the church grounds after the 11am service on Sunday, Sept. 25th!

Many social psychologists acknowledge that thirty days is the optimal period of time for changing human behavior. Within those thirty days, we can successfully develop healthy habits, as well as dispose of detrimental ones. Thus, the "thirty days hath September" can be life-changing.

I recently came across a Bible reading schedule that incorporates this thirty day time period.* It covers 30 significant Bible passages – one for each day of the thirty days that hath September. This is just a suggested list and is not meant to be a comprehensive reading program, but if you were to read each entry, each day of September, you will have read from Genesis to Revelation and at the same time developed a new habit of daily Bible reading.

letter from the associate pastor...


I recently began a monthly series in this space on what it means to be a PC(USA) Presbyterian—and why it matters. Last month, I introduced the Book of Confessions, the collection of twelve documents that form the foundation of our beliefs as a church.

We Presbyterians date our denominational roots to the Protestant Reformation, and ten of the twelve documents in the Book of Confession were written in the time of the Reformation or later. The first two of them, however, predate the Reformation and are considered universal Christian creeds: they are, of course, The Nicene Creed and The Apostles' Creed. Here are some fun facts about these two brief summaries of Christian doctrine:

The Nicene Creed was the Christian church's first official statement of doctrine. While it is relatively short, you probably won't be surprised to learn that it took over a century to be crafted and formally accepted: the creed first took shape at the council of Nicaea in the year 325, was revised at Constantinople in 381, and was finally declared authoritative by the Council of Chalcedon in 451.

Over the course of those 126 years of argument and controversy, heresies were identified, heretics were excommunicated, and orthodox views of the Trinity and the divine-human nature of Jesus Christ were codified. As a result, The Nicene Creed is the only creed accepted by all three major bodies of Christian churches: Eastern Orthodox, Roman Catholic, and Protestant. The Apostles' Creed was in a constant state of development from the second to the ninth centuries. It is so named not because it was actually written by the apostles but because its roots lay in the very earliest, first-century, baptismal liturgies of the church, from a time when the apostles were still living.

A line in The Apostles' Creed that often raises questions is the statement that Jesus "descended into hell." This curious element didn't find its way into the creed until the fourth century, and interpretations have varied: One



early view held that Christ entered hell to liberate the faithful of Old Testament times. A somewhat later interpretation was that Christ descended into hell in order to complete his victory over the kingdom of Satan. And finally, John Calvin—the spiritual father of the Presbyterian Church—interpreted Jesus's descent into hell as "the interior torment that Christ suffered for us" (Book of Confessions Study Edition, p. 18).

Clearly The Nicene and Apostles' Creeds are not Presbyterian creeds. However, their presence in our Book of Confessions and, on occasion, in our worship services reminds us that we are Christians first, and then Presbyterians: our roots go back not only to the Reformation but indeed to the very first followers of Jesus.

Next month, we'll dip our toes into some of those Reformation-era creeds (warning: those waters can be treacherous!).

session notes:

Session held its stated meeting by Zoom on August 8.

Rev. Mark Stanley called the meeting to order at 6:32pm, and declared a quorum present. Steve Culp shared a devotion by Dr. Larry Olesen and led us in an opening prayer.

Session noted with sorrow the passing of Thommy Snead on 7/12/2022, of Barbara Garrison on 8/7/2022, and of Rev. Dr. Jack Presseau, member of Presbytery, on 6/25/2022. We welcomed new member Betty Sloop on 6/19/2022.

On behalf of the Technology Committee, Conrad Shannon shared information on cybersecurity. He shared a number of security recommendations. Session unanimously approved the motion that all church employees and ministry chairs receive gmail accounts. These accounts can be tied to the church's Google drive where a secure folder can be created for each chair to back up their church related data. As chairs change roles, the data will be preserved as the account's owner is transferred.

Ed Spencer, for the Administration/Personnel Ministry, presented their revised charter for approval. The motion to approve their charter was passed with one member of Session opposed and one abstaining.

Recommendations for further revision of the charter were made, regarding the minimum number of people serving on the ministry, and regarding the duties of the ministry.

Ed also noted that there is some interest from the Black Mountain Home for Children in possibly using some of the downstairs room at Trinity. The Blue Ridge Humane Society may also be interested in rooms as well.

For the Re-Opening Task Force, Ed noted that although the task force is no longer meeting regularly, the task force members are still actively paying attention to the Covid-related information in Henderson county.

For the Local Mission Ministry, Leslie Nissen noted that she is working on getting information out that IAM does not want school supplies, as those needs have already been met. Local Mission will instead support the children of migrant workers, who IAM said were most in need, and will also request children's clothing.

For the Finance/Stewardship Ministry, Diane Bowers highlighted some points from the Finance Ministry. She noted the new credit card procedure. Chairs are encouraged to work with Katie to make purchases, so that sales tax is refundable. She also emphasized the planned budget workshops, on September 25, with select ministries on other dates.



SEASON OF CREATION 2022

The Season of Creation is a time to renew our relationship with our Creator and creation itself. Started as an ecumenical effort in the early 1990s, the Season starts with the World Day of Prayer for Creation on September 1 and ends with the Feast of St. Francis on October 4.

This year's theme is "Listen to the Voice of Creation" and the symbol is the burning bush, reminding us of the numerous destructive wildfires on our planet and the bush that Moses witnessed that did not burn. As God tells Moses, "I have heard their cry... I know their suffering... Come, now! I will send you... I will be with you" (Exodus 3:1–12).

This year at Trinity, we will observe the Season of Creation in worship with a different theme and scripture focus for each Sunday in September:

September 4: The Cosmos

"The heavens are telling the glory of God . . ."

September 11: The Climate

Norie Sanchez's ties to quilting began when she was a young girl. "My parents were big quilters. At one point, we sewed and gifted 42 bed quilts over the course of two years," she recalls.

After being exposed to the art of quiltmaking by her parents, Sanchez became fascinated with antique quilts of the 1930s, made from pieces of old feed-and-grain sacks with elaborate patterns — often florals or geometric designs — and Americana imagery. "It became so popular that a feed-sack quilt-pattern book was published," Sanchez remarks.

Today, Sanchez spends more time in watercolor but doesn't hesitate in praising the versatility of fiber art — which isn't limited to quilts and rugs. The genre includes everything that's created with a natural or synthetic fiber, such as fabric or yarn. "Fiber art is wonderful to work with; it's malleable, renewable, and readily available. If you have some fiber and a pair of scissors, the possibilities are endless," says Sanchez.

"Quilting and fiber work was traditionally done by women in homes for a purpose, whether that be a quilt for warmth, a garment to wear, or a rug on the floor," says Jensen. "Oftentimes, old ragged quilts would be tucked into new ones as padding," Sanchez adds.

No one can argue the practicality of such items. But the ladies agree wholeheartedly: Fiber art is fine art, and it merits more attention. It's not just a useful labor of love



— it's an art form to appreciate, elevate, and admire.

SYSTEMIC POVERTY

Next month, a new option will be offered during the Learning Hour. Beginning on September 18 at 9:45am, in Room 207, Paul Hugger will lead a group in exploring how Trinity Presbyterian Church can approach the Matthew 25 mandate to eradicate Systemic Poverty in Henderson County.

In January you may have responded to a Matthew 25 Survey. This emphasis came to us from the Presbyterian Mission USA and early this year our leadership established a Matthew 25 Task Force. The survey was designed by this task force to give you an opportunity to express how you feel about the prescribed initiatives as well as some other issues and concerns unique to our church and community.

Survey results indicate that your sense of priority mirror those of the Presbyterian Mission: Eradicate System Poverty, Dismantle Structural Racism, and Building Congregational Vitality. It also cited Voting Rights, Gun Violence, Environmental Justice, LGBTQ & Equality Issues, Affordable Health Care, Criminal Justice and Prison Reform, and Women's Rights. Many of these issues received considerable interest and are worthy of addressing, but we have given priority in terms of time, energy, and resources to the top three, of the five most cited concerns in this rank order:

- 1. Eradicate Systemic Poverty
- 2. Dismantle Structural Racism
- 3. Build Congregational Vitality
- 4. Address Homelessness/Advocate for Affordable Housing
- 5. Welcoming Immigrants

Paul's assignment is to help a cadre of interested church members gain a meaningful understanding concerning laws, policies, plans, and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor. In addition, this group will be challenged to provide a framework for educating and supporting families who are in poverty, families who demonstrate a desire to do the work needed to establish habits and behaviors conducive to life in the middle class.

This approach involves a community of church volunteers and human service agencies working together with these families to accomplish their goals. Paul will be using a book by Scott Miller - Bootstraps and Benefits: What the Right and Left Understand About Poverty and How We Can Work Together for Lasting Solutions. Books are available in the Narthex and can be purchased for \$11 or borrowed to pass on to another reader. Pray for spiritual discernment in your life as we approach this essential task as instructed by our Lord.

The Sanctuary was "packed" with happy, congenial souls who had purchased a ticket to help ease a bit of the suffering in Ukraine. As the evening progressed, it became evident that we were obviously receiving a greater benefit from this concert than the meager price of our tickets. "This Little Light of Mine" was such an appropriate finale, especially as the audience joined in the singing and sharing of the flashlights on their phones. This was truly a Stewardship moment in my life and in the lives of many that evening, I would suspect. We gave a little, but received an abundance of joy and memories to last a lifetime! Isn't this the way it works when we give of our time, talents and resources?


