## NIMBY VS. YIGBY: WWJD?

(Translation: "Not In My Back Yard" VS. "Yes, In God's

Back Yard!": What Would Jesus Do?)


NOT in MY back yard!

We've all heard it, or at least read about it. We may even have said it. It comes up often in discussions involving land and resource usage-particularly when it's happening a little too close to home. We all want more affordable housing, or places for those who are struggling in life. We all seem to need more storage units and who isn't in favor of a nice place to camp? What possible harm could come from a beautiful walking and biking trail linking communities and providing recreation? I was absolutely amazed to read recently that more than 200 people are joining a law-suit for compensation for perceived personal losses as a result of the building of the Ecusta Trail. The land may never have belonged to them, but they've grown accustomed to it's (unused) presence. Lest I come across as a hypocrite, let me assure you that a "Family Dollar" or a Gas Station at the bottom of my own hill WILL merit more than a few road signs! Arguments over property use are real and ongoing and likely to become more and more heated. We will need good community leadership and abundant listening skills to navigate the realities of life in the midst of scarce resources.

In a recent conversation with a couple of members of the Session of Trinity about a proposed repurposing of the former "Opp. House," one of them used a phrase that I was only hearing for the first time. I liked it and wanted to share it with you: YIGBY, or, "Yes, In God's Back Yard!" This is the idea that despite our normal and all too human reservations about the use of a property, at least some of the time it is our responsibility as children of God to go against the grain of our typical response and embrace the possibility of change... especially when that change is going to benefit neighbors with particular needs Historically, I suspect the and challenges. Church has both blocked and embraced significant social change. It can be a fine line; not without controversy. During this Lenten Season I am reminded that Jesus faced complex choices with an openness to God's leading and with a tendency to remind the powerful and the privileged of their responsibilities for the well-being of those without a voice. As His followers, we inherit this same complicated legасу.

#### **Endowment Committee**

ONE TIME GIFT OR ENDOWMENT (THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING)

Trinity is appreciative of financial gifts donated to the Church. Gifts come from current members, families and friends of current or deceased members, or other varied sources. The identity of the donor can be known, or it can be an anonymous donation.

When a donor, or a representative of the donor, decides to donate financially to Trinity, there are options available. The donor can simply donate a sum of money to be used by Trinity in a manner deemed most beneficial to the Church. The donor is properly thanked, and the money is spent.

Another option is to make the money last forever, or for as long as needed. Perhaps the person being honored with this donation has a

love for fresh flowers and prefers that the flowers in the sanctuary not be artificial.

The sum of the donor's gift would be placed in an Endowment Fund

recognizing the honored person. Only the interest from the gifted sum would be spent. The interest money would be managed by a member of the Worship Committee responsible for sanctuary flowers. It would be used to ensure that the sanctuary always have fresh flowers on Sunday, sufficient Poinsettias at Christmas, sufficient Lilies at Easter, and at other occasions when fresh flowers are needed in the sanctuary. The money would never run out. If the time should come that this endowment was no longer needed, the interest money would continue to be available for use by the Church in a manner most appropriate to the original wishes of the donor. The use of the endowment interest would be subject to approval by the Trinity Session.

Flowers in the sanctuary may not be a concern for all people, but Endowment Funds can be set up and managed for all missions and activities at Trinity. Contact any member of the Endowment Committee for more information. All financial donations are deeply appreciated regardless of the option used.
