

transitional pastor's letter...


October is Stewardship Emphasis Month at Trinity. Our stewardship theme for this year is "Faith Endures Here."

Every church I've pastored over the years does something like this. Most Presbyterian churches set aside a certain amount of time each year, usually in the fall, to talk about stewardship, which is the church's word for the personal and corporate management of God's good gifts.

Every year during Stewardship season we are reminded that we belong to God, and that God has given to each one of us a unique set of gifts to steward or manage for the glory of God, for the blessing of the Church, for the healing of God's wider world, and for our own daily and future needs.

One part of our yearly stewardship emphasis is to encourage each other to take inventory of all the gifts God has already given us, and then ask the question of what the Lord's will is in the using of those gifts. Typically, the gifts that God has given to many of us are: time, talent, money and possessions, relationships, a human body, the creation, and the gospel message.

Once we have taken inventory of our gifts, we turn to the question of who might need the particular gifts that the Lord has given us. The Lord is a great matchmaker in a variety of ways, but one noticeable expression of divine matchmaking is to match up specific people with gifts to share with specific people who need those gifts, and it is usually those who are actively looking to share their gifts who get matched up more frequently.

In Acts 20:35 Jesus is quoted as having said, "It is better to give than to receive." It is certainly a great blessing to receive gifts from God, but even better to share those gifts with those who need them.



YET IN THY DARK STREETS SHINETH
THE EVERLASTING LIGHT;

When managing my personal budget, I try to consider what expenditures I should be reducing. I know that some of my expenses are increasing. I know that in this heavily "consumerist driven" world, there are many temptations to dole out the cash and I am trying to be more intentional about doing this. I also consider what my saving goals are and the special extra things I want to do in the coming year.

Every year, I also remember the story about an old man who had had a very successful business career. He had started out without much but over the years his income grew until he became quite wealthy. When asked about how much he was pledging for donations to his church, he described giving more and more each year. Eventually, he was giving 90% of his lavish income. While I try to increase my pledge every year, I know I will never be able to give as much. However, I no longer consider the Biblical 10% tithe to be the ceiling amount.

Your Session strives to be very responsible about the expenditure of funds and your courtesy in returning the pledge card is important for their planning. All the wonderful things that happen at Trinity are due to your giving of time, talent and treasure. Faith Endures Here because of you.






On October 8th, Carol Cannon will join us to speak at Wednesday Night Live. She is a former United Methodist pastor, NAACP and Public Schools Strong member, and a passionate opponent of book censorship and banning. We hope to have community-wide attendance. A selection of banned books will be on display in the Narthex through October; they will be available for those would want them.

Guns to Gardens event occurred Aug 16th at Trinity and was hosted by Moms Demand Action. The gathering featured on on-site blacksmith cutting metal from previous gun surrender events and shaping them into tools and decorations. Our Guiding Coalition (steering committee), has friends from First United Methodist, Grace Lutheran, and First Congregational. Dick Bobb, Bob Forsythe, and Paul Hugger are meeting with Pisgah Legal Services to meet the legal requirements for establishing our Circles chapter as a 501c3, non profit corporation. The reason for a stand alone non profit is to accommodate contributions from sources who may be disinclined to contribute to a church or government agency. A Board of Directors is being formed that will mirror components of the Guiding Coalition.

Circles has a social justice component, a 'Big View' team, which addresses issues common to people burdened by poverty. Issues such as

Our Circles Guiding Coalition has made addressing affordable housing issues a priority. Housing First, for example, is a model being considered by the Henderson Social Justice Network, a planning/working group with which our Big View team addresses safe and affordable housing.
