# PASTOR'S CORNER



Building on the writings of Augustine and Aquinas, people have spent centuries trying to imagine the conditions that would allow War to be considered JUST. Thoughtful Pacifists have pointed out that there really can be no such thing. We are, after all, talking about War; and the Bible clearly forbids murder. Others have held that some kind of, "Just War Theory," is valuable because, in the real world, conflict is inevitable and we need to have some kind of restraint on the worst human behaviors. Though there has never been universal agreement on the criteria for a Just War, and though all sides in most conflicts consider their own cause to be just, here are the typical components that need to be considered if one is seeking to engage in a "Just War."

Building on the writings of Augustine and Aquinas, people have spent centuries trying to imagine the conditions that would allow War to be considered JUST. Thoughtful Pacifists have pointed out that there really can be no such thing. We are, after all, talking about War; and the Bible clearly forbids murder. Others have held that some kind of, "Just War Theory," is valuable because, in the real world, conflict is inevitable and we need to have some kind of restraint on the worst human behaviors. Though there has never been universal agreement on the criteria for a Just War, and though all sides in most conflicts consider their own cause to be just, here are the typical components that need to be considered if one is seeking to engage in a "Just War."

**What is a Just War?** - Six conditions must be satisfied for a war to be considered just:

1. The war must be for a just cause.
2. The war must be lawfully declared by a lawful authority.
3. The intention behind the war must be good.
4. All other ways of resolving the problem should have been tried first.
5. There must be a reasonable chance of success.
6. The means used must be in proportion to the end that the war seeks to achieve.

If we think about the current conflict involving Russia and Ukraine, do we see any of these six conditions being observed? How do our answers to this question impact the possible short term and long term ramifications of this conflict? Some have observed that Christians really shouldn't even be thinking or talking about "just" wars... the two possibilities cannot exist side by side. I think that Christians must consider these questions, and if possible, offer even better alternatives! The alternatives to living and acting beyond these boundaries are potentially earth-shattering.

## note from the associate pastor...

Once again this year, several Trinity children and youth will be attending summer programs at Camp Grier, and outdoor ministry center of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and I'll be joining some of them for a week at camp pastor and worship leader. Camp Grier is a wonderful outdoor ministry, and if you don't know much about it, here's a little background:

Until the late 1940s, Concord Presbytery had used Camp Fellowship on the Catawba River for summer camp programs. When Duke Power revealed plans to build Lake Norman, the Presbytery was in danger of losing its camping facilities. Undaunted, Robert D. Grier, of Statesville, purchased 600 acres of land in Old Fort in the summer of 1950 in order to start a new camp. Mr. Grier set up a saw mill on the camp property and volunteers from the churches built the buildings in Main Camp. Camp Grier, named in memory of Mr. Grier's father, the Rev. John McDill Grier, was formally founded on July 15, 1952.



There's a saying: "You can pave the world or you can put on shoes." Summer camp teaches kids how to put on shoes. Rather than looking for the smoothest and easiest path through life, experiences in the outdoors give young people the skills and confidence to embrace challenging circumstances, persevere to solve critical problems, and see the world through a lens of compassion. # session notes:

The Session held its stated meeting by Zoom on April 11, and a special Session meeting on March 28 to discuss matters related to the Covid-19 pandemic.

At the Special Session Meeting on March 28, Session unanimously approved that, starting on Palm Sunday, face masks would be optional, standing during hymn singing would resume, and that food and beverage preparation and consumption would resume.

Additionally, at the Special Session Meeting, an addendum to the Building Use Form was approved unanimously, updating the Hold Harmless clause.

Rev. Dr. Mark Stanley called the stated meeting to order at 6:30 on March 14, and opened with prayer.

Session noted with sorrow the passing of Sue Shrek on April 8. We also noted the transfer of Anne and Gene Kirkley to Covenant Presbyterian Church (PCA).

A letter from a member of the congregation regarding our weekly bulletin and its current format was read. A number of thoughts were shared, and the matter was referred to the Worship Ministry at Session's request.

Mark Slaughter, for Building and Grounds, moved to send a letter of appreciation from Session to thank Susan Kincaid for the gift that enabled the Dan Kincaid Memorial Lights. This motion was passed by unanimous acclamation.

Mark also provided an update on the building accessibility of Trinity, particularly focused on entrance, elevator and bathroom access. The motion to request Building and Grounds to have architectural schematics produced by several firms, considering possible goals regarding ADA compliance, and supporting building, elevator, and bathroom access, brought by Building and Grounds, was passed unanimously.



Leslie Nissen, for Local Mission, noted that the Lutheran church has a large initiative working with refugees from Afghanistan. Trinity is considering forming a Refugee Resettlement Task Force to investigate possible ways of aiding refugees in the Henderson/Buncombe/Transylvania county area, potentially with multiple area churches. Local and Global Missions as well as the Matthew 25 Task Force could all be involved in this mission.

Molly Garnett closed the meeting with prayer.

Session's next stated meeting will be May 9, at 6:30pm, by Zoom.

Within a decade, most newly manufactured cars and trucks of all sizes will use electricity. Now, burning gasoline for transportation contributes 25% of climate change-causing emissions. Of course, switching to electric vehicles (EV) will only make a difference if the electricity to recharge them is produced by clean energy sources, not by fossil fuels. As a new technology, the performance of electric vehicles improves with time and research. Some studies show electric vehicles actually cost less to operate, right now. Did you know the federal tax credit is \$7,500? There are several apps that locate charging stations and one can be placed in your garage. A recent study by the

U.S. Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) and Idaho National Laboratory gives us the most comprehensive picture one that varies state by state.

### SO WHERE IS TRINITY?


On Easter Sunday morning, a total of 92 cars were counted in Trinity's parking lot for both services. (If the car was there for both services, then it was "double counted"). Of that total, 14 were hybrid (gas and electric vehicles) and 3 were Chevy Volt electric vehicles with gasoline backup. So, 17 of 92 or 18.5% were alternative fueled vehicles.







## Finance & Stewardship Ministry

We had a good first quarter to begin our year. Income has exceeded expenses by \$42,600. Our income is in line with budget and last year at the same time. Some larger pledges have come in already, resulting in pledge receipts being \$25,000 above last year through March.

Expenses are running about \$6000 under budget so far but \$5000 more than last year. With the church opening up closer to a "normal" level of activity, this trend will likely continue.

The balance in our capital accounts is \$43,700 with two projects in the pipeline.

The three-person team that performs our annual internal control review has completed their work. Their report is in progress.






